The Spas and Waters of Montecatini

Used for therapeutic treatments for diseases of the metabolism, digestive system and liver, they also offer numerous benefits for general well-being. These thermal establishments are immersed in beautiful parks and enriched by frescoes and Art Nouveau decorations, perfect for those seeking the unique atmosphere of the Belle Époque.



The Baths of Montecatini have been renowned since the time of Grand Duke Leopold, who promoted their urban development. The entrance to the Tettuccio Baths is a majestic tribute to water, celebrated as a vital element through artistic and monumental fountains.

Art and Architecture on Viale Verdi

Viale Verdi, also known as the Vialone dei Bagni, is the architectural heart of Montecatini. It starts from Piazza del Popolo and houses buildings of great value:

Palazzina Regia: Former summer residence of the Medici family.

Monumento ai Caduti: Work by Giuseppe Petroni in the Parco Reale.

Palazzo Comunale: Built between 1913 and 1919, it houses the Montecatini Contemporary Art (MO.C.A.), with works such as the famous *Donna avvolta in un Volo d'Uccello* by Joan Miró.



Airone Rosso: A modern steel sculpture by artist Fabio De Poli, a tribute to the city.

The Padiglione dei Sali, located near the Teatro Verdi, is a former kiosk from the early 20th century now home to commercial activities.

Fountains: Monuments of Water

Montecatini celebrates water with fountains that are true works of art:

Fontana Monumentale: In Piazza del Popolo, with bronze decorations made in 1926.

Fontana Mazzoni: Built in the 1930s at the train station, it is decorated with blue mosaics and water features.

Scultura d'Acqua: Created by Pol Bury in 2004, it is located in the Parco Comunale and combines mechanical elements and water flows for suggestive musical effects.

Other notable fountains are the Duetto d'Acqua, the Rana e l'Airone and the Fontana dei Coccodrilli, located in the Regina and Tettuccio establishments.



Montecatini Alto: A Medieval Village

Montecatini Alto, situated 300 meters above sea level, retains the charm of its medieval origins. The ancient walls destroyed in 1554 by the Florentines of Cosimo I de' Medici are still partially visible, along with the Rocca and the Torre del Mastio.

It is easily reached by a 19th-century funicular, still in operation. In the central Piazzetta Giusti there are medieval remains such as the Palazzo del Podestà and the picturesque Loggia del Parlascio, once the seat of public assemblies and a market. The square is now animated by restaurants and wine bars offering excellent wines and local delicacies.



Gastronomy: The Cialde of Montecatini

A symbol of the gastronomic tradition of Montecatini are the Cialde, round and light biscuits with an almond filling. Handcrafted since 1920, they are free of butter or added fats and perfect for accompanying tea or sweet wines. Their simplicity and genuineness make them a culinary excellence.
